**111** Eagle Street, the tallest building in Brisbane, is located between the Riverside Centre (1986) and the Riparian Plaza (2005) designed by Harry Seidler. This striking new edifice is located in the heart of Brisbane CBD's golden triangle, adjacent to the Brisbane River and the Storey Bridge.

The owners of the building, the GPT Group, held a competition which was won by architects Cox Rayner, in collaboration with Arup.

The tall, tree-like structure of the building deliberately references adjacent fig and banyan trees. The building reaches for the sky, imitating the way plants grow towards the light. The Eagle Street development, a world class premium grade office tower, has achieved a 6 Star Green Star office design rating.

The featured images illustrate the arresting ground floor lobby which winds its way around the core of the building, and the mezzanine.

The extensive lobby floor is principally tiled in Nero Tempesta marble. The stairway which leads to the mezzanine is tiled with Bianco Perlino marble. The interior of the lobby is clad with Ocean Blue travertine. Vast panels of low e-glass reduce heat and shed abundant natural light on the stone surfaces. 05
